To our Village of Whiting Residents - From your elected Village President, and your elected Village Board

It was great to see the nice turnout by residents for the December 3rd Public Hearing on the 2025 Village Budget. Those that stayed for the whole meeting heard about the challenges of managing the financial aspects of a village in these times when base levies are capped by the State, and the Village lost a major source of revenue when the mill closed down. Since that double whammy hit, inflation has not waned, and if anything, elevated somewhat. In addition, the State transferred ownership for Post Road to the Village, and several Village roads received needed repairs, along with the Whiting Avenue Bridge. Most of this maintenance was done before things got so bad that expensive restorations were required – which makes good fiscal sense. Residents in attendance also heard about the many ways which the elected representatives and the Village Employees are frugal with your tax dollars.

In addition, they were able to again hear about how the Public Fire Protection (PFP) costs were transferred to the quarterly Water bills (this was detailed in the summer/fall newsletter), the amount of which is set by the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin. It pays for the infrastructure needed (beyond what would be required of simple residential service) to fight fires within the Village.

Looking forward, our Village Auditor pointed out to the attendees that the Village is moving to a stronger financial footing, which should help even out the annual taxes (smooth out the bumps). We also showed (again, trying to be frugal with your tax dollars) that we obtained an over \$400,000 grant for the Polk Street project, planned to take place after many years of delay, in 2025. Besides fixing a bad road, this will help make the area safer for the students of Ben Franklin Junior High. We will also repair Sherman Avenue while a needed sewer utility project occurs (again doing it when it is most cost effective to do so) making a better road down to the care facilities which unfortunately see frequent ambulance runs, not to mention needed bus service.

So yes, it is recognized that the bill you just received, along with the PFP which will be on the water bills, is higher than last year, and that hurts in the pocketbook, but when you look at the comparison to 2 years ago, the story is different.

It was rewarding to hear from at least a dozen residents at the meeting that now they understood, and while nobody likes tax increases, they knew why. Many expressed they felt misled on this issue by postings on Social Media, particularly Facebook. Don't believe the spin you often get there. If you have questions, I recommend that you contact a Village Trustee or President at any time. Most people don't realize this, but the Public Comment period of Village Board meetings are not structured as a question-and-answer period, but as a time for the Board to hear Comments from the Public, so waiting for a Village Board meeting is not best.

We're All Connected

Maintaining the Integrity of Your Public Drinking Water System

Did you know... Your water can become contaminated if connections to your plumbing system are not properly protected! To avoid contamination of your drinking water, backflow preventers are required by state plumbing codes wherever there is an actual or potential hazard of a cross-connection.

What is a cross-connection? A cross-connection is an actual or potential connection between the safe drinking water (potable) supply and a source of contamination or pollution. When you turn on the faucet, you expect the water coming out to be as safe as when it left the treatment plant. However, certain hydraulic conditions, left unprotected within your plumbing system may allow hazardous substances to contaminate your own drinking water or even the public drinking water supply.

Back siphonage and backpressure. Water normally flows in one direction. However, water can sometimes flow backwards, called backflow. Backflow can occur in two situations, back siphonage and backpressure. Back siphonage occurs due to a loss of pressure within the water system like, for example, a fire fighting emergency or a water main break or repair. Backpressure may be created when a source of pressure, like a boiler, creates a pressure greater than the pressure supplied by the potable water system.

In your bathroom and kitchen... Look for the ASSE #1002 standard symbol on the device and packaging in your toilet tank. If your device does not contain this symbol it should be replaced with an approved ASSE #1002 anti-siphon ball cock assembly. Make sure handheld shower heads are compliant by letting them hang freely and confirming that they are one inch above the flood level. In addition, be sure to check to make sure the device has an ASSE #1014 or ASME code 112.18.1 stamped on the handle. In your kitchen make sure all dishwashers are installed with a proper "air gap" and that all faucets and detachable hoses work properly and do not lay in the basin of the sink.

A few more things... Be sure to **not** submerge hoses in buckets, pools, tubs or sinks and make sure the ends of the hoses are clear of contaminants. Verify or install a simple hose bibb vacuum breaker on all threaded faucets. Never use a spray attachment without a backflow prevention device. Make sure water softeners are installed with an "air gap" and that any waste pipes do not go directly into a floor drain.
